Food for Thought: How to Stretch Forages when Inventory is Low

This summer corn silage inventories were depleted because of the late haylage harvest and late corn planting. This caused many producers to increase haylage in rations to stretch or replace corn silage. Now, haylage inventories are running low on area farms and some rations may need to contain more corn silage, which, in turn will alter the ration and could affect corn silage inventories next summer. If you find your forage bunks are emptier than they should be this time of year, below are a few ways you might be able to stretch your forages through the winter.

- 1. Allocate forages to best suit each animal group. Example: Allocate best haylage to milking cows and use or purchase moderate quality hay/haylage for heifers. Heifer rations can be balanced to suit.
- 2. **Manage Animal Inventories.** Consider not milking more cows than are needed to fill quota and incentive days and manage the number of heifers. If heifer and cow inventories are higher than necessary, sell some of the bottom end of the herd. Consider custom feeders for non-essential groups.
- 3. **Purchase high fibre by-products to reduce forage requirements in the ration.** Example: by-products include beet pulp, corn gluten feed, JFM GSPs and soyhulls.
- 4. **Reduce Refusals**. Example: Feed for only 1-2% refusals to lactating cows. Important: Do not feed to zero refusals.
- 5. Limit Feed Heifers: Feed a balanced ration to weight as opposed to free choice
- 6. **Keep Dry Matters Current.** When dry matters change you may be under or over feeding forage. Overfeeding (or underfeeding) forages unbalances the ration and is a waste of feed.

Talk to your JFM Sales Rep about forage inventory. Looking at forage inventories now can prevent forages from running low before next harvest. Your JFM Sales Rep can help you determine the best way to stretch forages on your farm. *by Trish Dunn*

2019 Corn Crop


