No-Stress Handling Techniques Demonstrated at Industry Workshop

Last month a "no-stress" cattle handling workshop was held at Carl Frook's farm in Elmwood. The guest speaker was Corey Conan who manages a 10,000-head feedlot, 10 minutes from Lethbridge, Alberta. Corey is also a sales rep for Daniels Chutes, a company whose chutes are known for their low-stress handling of cattle and whose chute was used in the demonstration. Corey's experience comes from working with cattle every day and from taking the time to observe them. Corey was later introduced to Dr. Tom Noffsinger, a vet from Nebraska that has over one million cattle in his practice and who has had a large impact on who Corey has become today. Corey learned how to make livestock "decide" that they want

to do the things you want them to do, rather than try to "make" them do what you want them to do. Corey encouraged the participants to not hurry, and to be calm and patient. We tend to rush too much when working cattle and ultimately it takes more time. Whenever possible, always work cattle from their left side. Just try walking a pen on their right and watch the reaction, they will always turn so the left side of their head is following you. Then do it again working the left - you will be amazed! No canes, whips or shockers are required. Being calm and quiet will pay dividends. If you have cattle that balk in the chute, don't poke them; just run your hand over the back against the grain of the hair or from tail to shoulder a couple times and they will move. Watch a mother cow on pasture, if her calf is laying down and she wants it to move she will lick it's back that way! Afterwards the group shared its own tips and Producers and Industry Personnel watch as thoughts, as Corey preaches "we can all learn from each other". The group went on to say, that if a pen is getting worked up, turn your back on them or put your hands in handling techniques. Photo by Doug Helm

your pockets and turn away. Watch their flight response signals, eye colour, ears twitching and position, head carriage then observe from a 45-degree angle. Corey wrapped by saying "Those are the things I have picked up on over many years and I agree, we are all still learning". The people in attendance came away with the message, that low stress handling will pay dividends, in the overall well-being of the animals we work with and ultimately in the economic benefit to producers.
