Nitrates? Are they in my Forages?

With the dry summer conditions experienced across most of Ontario, producers are asking themselves if nitrates could be present in their corn fields. The answer is "maybe"! "Maybe" because most areas did receive some rain in the later part of August and depending on when you harvest your corn, the nitrate level that could have been present may now be lower. For piece of mind, JFM suggests you follow the below simple steps to ensure you are taking the necessary precautions to avoid issues with nitrates in your corn silage.

- Test your corn silage for nitrates before feeding it
- Do not feed fresh forages until you know their nitrate level



Much of the SW Ontario corn crop has experienced varying levels of heat stress and/or drought increasing the possibility of nitrates being present.

Use extra caution when filling silos – high nitrate levels in forages can increase the threat of available deadly silo gases

E"cow"nomics Whole Milk vs. Milk Replacer

With the recently announced quota increase coupled with the province's current incentive days, dairy producers are challenging themselves to fulfill all possible income opportunities while available. This is also a logical time to consider the economics of feeding calves whole milk vs. milk replacer. When a dairy has extra milk that is not saleable, it is understandable that a farmer would use that extra milk to feed their calves. When milk however is not in surplus, it can be more economical to feed the calves milk replacer.

One way to understand the basic economics of this is to calculate the cost of the milk replacer per litre fed and compare that to the current price of milk (litre). Labour, cost of production and capital may be also considered when determining these values. Talk to your Jones Dairy Consultant to assist you in determining your values and to calculate the potential costs or savings.



Another part of the equation to understand is the quality of the milk or milk replacer being fed. Jones milk replacers are formulated using an optimum ratio of fat to protein to ensure the calves gain, remain healthy, and grow to their genetic potential. Another benefit of milk replacer is the addition of Deccox®, which whole milk does not contain. Additionally, Jones milk replacers are balanced with medium and short chain fatty acids which are conducive to rumen development, fewer treatment days and increased average daily gain. These short and medium chain fatty acids are not found in conventional whole milk at levels that are beneficial to the calf, due to today's high energy dairy rations.
